Fair Objectives

The objectives of this Society shall be to encourage interest, promote improvements in and advance the standards of agriculture, domestic industry and rural life by:

- a. Researching the needs of the agricultural community and developing programs to meet those needs;
- b. Promoting the conservation of natural resources and encouraging the beautification of the agricultural community;
- c. Supporting and providing facilities to encourage activities intended to enrich rural life;
- d. Holding an agricultural fair annually, featuring competitions for which prizes may be awarded.
- e. Develop & promote educational programs & competitions for the purpose of creating youth awareness of local agricultural history, current activities and future opportunities

RULES & REGULATIONS

Membership, Entry Fees, Prize Money

1. An annual membership of \$10.00 is payable to the D.D.A.S.
2. Any person or organization making a donation exceeding the membership fee to the D.D.A.S. may designate one person to exercise the privileges of membership to the society.
3. Membership is required for adults to exhibit at the fair, unless otherwise specified in class description.
4. With the exception of Senior Citizens (65 years & over), Junior Exhibitors (16 years & under, membership will be retained from prize money, providing the prize money exceeds the current membership fee by a minimum of \$10.00.
5. A handling fee of \$1.00 for each entry will be charged for mailed in exhibits.
6. A late fee of \$10.00 per entry will be charged for entries submitted after the deadline. **“PLEASE HELP OUR VOLUNTEER COORDINATORS BY HAVING REGISTRATIONS & EXHIBITS IN BY THE DEADLINE”**

General Fair Entries

7. **All entries must be registered** at the fair office no later than the Tuesday, August 14, 2018.
Entry forms can be submitted from the website www.drydenfair.ca ; mail: RR # 3, Ste 300, Box 4, Dryden, ON P8N 3G2 , email info@drydenfair.ca or in person. **Entry forms** (not entry articles) will be accepted by the Secretary in the Fairgrounds Office **Monday, August 13 and Tuesday, August 14, from 12 noon to 7 p.m.**

Every effort should be made to have your **entry forms** in by Tuesday August 14, 2018. A late fee of \$10.00 may be applied to late entries.

Entry tags can usually be picked up within two hours after leaving entry form. Entry tags will NOT be mailed.

Entry tags must be closed (to cover name of exhibitor) and attached to articles prior to bringing articles to the exhibition hall. Be sure they are firmly attached to prevent loss in transportation or placement of items.

NOTE: It is not necessary to sign entry tags.

1. **Exhibit hall** entries will be accepted at the fairgrounds office between 9:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. Wednesday, August 22, 2018.. **“PLEASE HELP OUR VOLUNTEER COORDINATORS BY HAVING REGISTRATIONS AND EXHIBITS IN BY THE DEADLINE”**

2. Exhibit hall entries must have any distinguishing marks covered.
3. Entries made in the wrong class/section may be moved to the appropriate one at the discretion of the Secretary. Articles will be brought to the office to have tags checked and entries changed.
4. No judge shall exhibit in any class he/she is to judge.
5. Exhibitors are limited to one entry per section in the exhibit hall, except in the Charity Class
6. Exhibits must be the property (made or grown) of the exhibitor unless otherwise stated with the class rules.
7. **Any Class asking for the article/entry to be named: it will be the responsibility of the exhibitor to write the information on the entry tag.**
8. Any person interfering with the judge will forfeit any premiums to which the exhibitor might be entitled.
9. Exhibits may be collected between **10:30 pm - 12midnight Saturday, or 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. on Sunday. No Early Birds, please.** For special arrangements please call the fair office 223-6766 and leave a message or email info@drydenfair.ca **Baking may be picked up Friday after 8:00 p.m. unless exhibitor wishes to leave them.** Perishable items not picked up by 2:00 p.m. Sunday will be disposed of by the exhibit hall co-ordinator.
10. Any articles not claimed by the Saturday after the fair will be disposed of by the Secretary after confirming that special arrangements have not been made.
11. The Society will as far as possible. take care of all exhibits but no responsibility is assumed in case of theft, damage or loss.
12. A committee of no fewer than 3 Directors. including an Executive. may handle issues arising related to the fair.
13. Written grievances must be submitted to the Secretary prior to September 15th.
14. Infringement of the rules may result in loss of prizes and exhibitor privilege.

Livestock, Pet & Poultry Entries

1. Exhibitors may enter a maximum of two entries per section **Exhibits must be the property of the exhibitor unless otherwise stated with the class rules.** Entry forms must be received at the fair office by Tuesday August 14, 2018. Entries can be submitted from the website www.drydenfair.ca ; mailed to: D.D.A.S., R R # 3, Ste 300, Box 4, Dryden, ON, P8N 3G2 or emailed info@drydenfair.ca; or brought to the office between noon and 7:00 p.m. August 13/14, 2018 **“PLEASE HELP OUR VOLUNTEER COORDINATORS BY HAVING REGISTRATIONS AND EXHIBITS IN BY THE DEADLINE”**
2. **Livestock & Horseshow Coordinator’s are responsible and in charge of all activities in the barn & showing areas. Any problems or changes must be taken to them and they will assist the exhibitors.**
3. Livestock exhibits **must** be on the fairgrounds according to the schedule below:
Cattle (including animals for commercial displays) - by 3:00 p.m. Thursday
4-H Steers must be on the grounds, by 3:00 p.m. Thursday

Small Animals (swine, sheep, goats, poultry) - Between 12 noon and 7:00 pm on Wednesday, August 22. **Judging will take place on Thursday morning.** Aunt Sally’s and barns to be closed during judging. No exhibitors/spectators allowed during the judging or for safety reasons, during the livestock shows.

Horses - see Horseshow Rules

All livestock should remain on the grounds until **6:00 p.m. Saturday.** Removal to be done safely with guidance/permission from the Livestock/Horseshow Coordinator.
4. All calves exhibited must be at least 2 months old.
5. Purebred animals must be registered in the Canadian National Records. Those under one year must be eligible for registration. Exhibitors must produce proof of verified registration upon request.
6. Bulls one year and over must have a nose ring or show humbug. Handler must be an adult.
7. **4-H calves may be entered in the open classes provided the exhibitor has completed an entry form and submitted it to the office by the Tuesday August 14, 2018.**
8. Cows entered in the cattle classes must have produced a calf.
9. Exhibitor is responsible for livestock care, feeding, bedding, and keeping area clean. Hay, straw, shavings provided by DDAS, all other feed/supplements supplied by the exhibitor
Livestock coordinator will ensure exhibitors keep all feed buckets closed during the judging

as they are a distraction to the animals being led out to the ring.

10. Any stall/livestock area not cleaned up by noon on Sunday the exhibitor will be charged a \$50/stall cleanup fee

Fair Isle is a specific form of colour work knitting named for Fair Isle, a small island off the coast of Scotland where knitters were known for their skill with the technique. Fair Isle traditionally uses two colors of yarn in a row, though more than two colors can be used in a project. GARDEN RULES:

The Dryden and District Agricultural Society is again offering your child the opportunity to participate in a children's Garden Competition. If your child is interested in planting a garden and accepts the responsibility of weeding and caring for the plot throughout the summer season, we hope you will encourage and lend your guidance in this undertaking.

All children, both rural and urban, in the Dryden district are eligible to participate. The rules of this competition are stated below. To avoid disappointment be sure to follow the instructions carefully. Gardens which do not comply with these rules may be disqualified. **Note sizes are a guideline only with the increased use of containers and raised beds such as the community gardens, size of garden will not be a reason to disqualify if it reasonable for the age level.**

1. Entries must be solely made and hand quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS) fair to be eligible for this competition .
2. Entry quilts must be a minimum of 324” measured on the perimeter (smaller quilts will not be eligible to proceed to the next level of competition.)
3. The winner’s name and pattern to be displayed at the Fair on sign provided by OAAS.
4. Judging will occur at local fairs and district levels. A Provincial Grand Champion Quilt will be selected at the Annual OAAS Convention.
5. Upon making an entry into the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Quilt Competition, the Exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition.
6. The winning Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Champion Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future District and/or Convention OAAS competition.

Local Fair Competitions

1. 2. Quilt/ to be measured on the perimeter. Total perimeter measurement to be a minimum of 324 inches Note the quilt can be square, rectangular, etc.
3. Judging will occur at local fairs and district levels. A Provincial Grand Champion Machine Quilted Quilt will be selected at the Annual OAAS Convention.
4. Upon making entry into the OAAS Machine Quilting Competition, the Exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition.
5. The winning OAAS Machine Quilted Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future District and/or OAAS Provincial competition.
6. The winner's name to be displayed at the Fair on sign provided by OAAS.
7. Quilt must have visible machine quilting.

Local Fair Competitions

1. Each local fair is entitled to send only one Grand Champion Machine-Quilted Quilt , judged best of show of all eligible machine quilted Quilt to the District Competition **OR**
If any entry wins *Grand Champion* or *Best of Show* of all eligible *Machine-Quilted Quilts* at more than one Fair, the other Fairs at which this item was entered and won, should enter their *Reserve Champion* or *Second Best of Show* of eligible Machine-Quilted Quilt in the District Competition.

NOTE: If an Exhibitor wins *Grand Champion* or *Best of Show* of all eligible *Machine-Quilted classes* at other than his/her own fair, or at more than one Fair, the Exhibitor must consider the Agricultural Society nearest his/her home address as the one from which the Quilt will be sent to the District competition.

2. An Exhibitor who wins more than one Best of Show title with a different machine quilted Quilt at different Fairs shall be entitled to enter each winning Quilt to compete at the District Competition.
3. Local Homecraft Divisions are requested to judge a *Grand Champion* or *Best of Show* of all eligible *Machine-Quilted Quilt* as well as a *Reserve Champion* or *Second Best of Show* of eligible Machine-Quilted Quilt.

NOTE: The *Grand Champion* and the *Reserve Grand Champion* are judged from all first and second prize ELIGIBLE machine quilted Quilts.

For first place entry going to District and/or convention DDAS Rep will take eligible items.

District Competitions

1. Judging at the District Competitions will be the responsibility of each OAAS District.
2. The first place winning machine quilted Quilt from the District Competition is eligible to enter the OAAS Championship Machine Quilting Competition at the Annual Convention. In cases where the winner of the

District first prize machine quilted Quilt decides not to enter the Final Championship Competition, the Second Prize Quilt winner at the District Competition will be eligible.

3. The Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies will award a ribbon and the District will award prize money of \$25 for First Place, \$15 for Second and \$10 for Third to Exhibitors of winning hand quilted quilts at each District Competition.
4. All District entries must be registered on the OAAS Championship Machine Quilting Entry Form, returned to the OAAS Secretary, by December 1.

OAAS Championship Machine Quilting Competition

1. Judges who officiate the Championship Machine Quilting Competition at the Annual Convention will be appointed by the OAAS.
2. All articles entered in the competition must be machine quilted.
3. All entries must be received for judging by the competition coordinator in the designated room between 7:30am to 8:30am on the Friday of the Annual Convention of OAAS.
4. The competition coordinator will assign a number for each entry. This number will only identify entries during the judging process.
5. No exhibitor shall be permitted to place or attach any Fair or other Exhibitor identification on his or her entry. Please remove all tags, ribbons, etc.
6. No persons other than the judges and designated officials will be permitted to enter the designated judging room until after the judging and winner has been announced.
7. Any Exhibitor or any person acting on behalf of the Exhibitor who violates any of the Rules and Regulations or who interferes with the judges or the judging process shall be disqualified and the entry will be removed from the competition.
8. No machine quilted Quilt shall be removed from the display viewing area until the official closing of the viewing room and designated time of pick up.
9. The OAAS shall not be held liable for any loss occasioned by fire, theft, accident, condition of article, the negligence of other Exhibitors, officials or otherwise.
10. Any protests must be made to the Homecraft Division of the OAAS in writing within 5 working days after the last day of the Convention.
11. The entry judged *Best of Show* at the February Convention will be declared the *OAAS Champion Machine Quilted Quilt*

PRIZES:

1st ... \$500.00 GRAND CHAMPION PRIZE will be awarded and the exhibitor will retain ownership of the entry. A certificate and ribbon will also be awarded to the winner.

2nd ... \$100.00 RESERVE GRAND CHAMPION PRIZE will be awarded and the exhibitor will retain ownership of the entry.
